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How many people care?





5.7m people reported being a carer in the UK in the 2021 Census



However, Carers UK estimate there are 10.6m carers in the UK



4.3m people become a carer, every year



Broken down, this means 12,000 people become a carer every day in the UK.

If you look after someone who needs your help because of a disability or long term ill health condition, it is important to know your rights to access support for you as well as the person you look after.



As a carer, it's important to understand your rights to access the support available to you. However, many carers are unaware of these rights, especially when facing challenging decisions that impact their role.

Our <u>Carers Rights Checklist</u> helps you understand and exercise your rights, ensuring both you and the person you care for receive the support you deserve.



Working Carers Statistics

600 people a day give up work due to caring



90% of working carers are aged 30+

8 in 10 carers are working age

1 in 3 carers are in professional or management roles

1 in 7 are juggling care

12% rise in carers leaving work in the last decade.

More legal rights for carers at work



Right to take time off in emergencies to care for dependants.



Right **not** to be **discriminated against** or harassed



Parental leave and shared parental leave.







What is a Carer Passport?






A Carer's Passport is a document that recognises your role as a carer to access specific support, benefits, and services at work and in other settings. It is usually issued by employers, local authorities, or other organisations like Carers First.

The passport may provide various benefits, such as flexible working arrangements, priority access to support services, or discounts. The carer's passport helps to formally acknowledge your carer status, ensuring you receive the appropriate recognition and assistance while juggling work with caring for someone.

Carer's Allowance First







Carer's Allowance - who is eligible?

Criteria to claim <u>Carer's Allowance</u>



Providing 35+ hours of care a week



Care for some who receives



Attendance allowance



Personal Independence Payment



Disability Living Allowance



Armed Forces Independent Payment



Not in full-time education



Do not earn more that £151 net a week.





How much is Carer's Allowance worth?



Carer's Allowance is paid at £81.90 per week



At **State Pension age**, you can only claim either the State Pension or Carers Allowance



Underlying Carer's Allowance can help at State Pension age



Check the benefits claimed by the person you care for.







What is **Universal Credit?**







Working aged benefit (16-65)



Means tested



Households on a low income



Monthly payment



Replaces legacy benefits.



Who qualifies for Universal Credit (UC)?

Universal Credit support may include housing, childcare, and costs for raising a child with a disability.



Single or joint (couple) claimants

Age over 18 and below pensionable age

Part and full time students with a dependent child and claim DLA or PIP Accept the 'claimant commitment' Have capital under £16000



Personal Independence Payment?





Someone of working age (16 to state pension) who has **limited ability** and **mobility** to perform daily tasks



Score **8 points** to get the standard rate and **12 points** to the enhanced rate of <u>Personal Independence Payment</u> (PIP)



Not entitled to Armed Forces Independence Payments



Does **not** receive Disability Living Allowance (DLA).
